Indigenous Law

PILC collaborates with the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs to engage with families of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls (MMIWG), Elders and a coalition of service providers.

- Provides a range of legal services to eligible individuals or groups who are taking legal action that will impact the law or groups of people
- The PILC represents groups and individuals on issues affecting the environment, human rights, Indigenous people, consumers and low-income persons.

Advocacy Unit - attached to the Public Interest Law Centre

Takes on cases that affect individuals facing issues with residential tenancies or government benefits.

Applicants must qualify for legal aid.

Supports victims of serious crimes (victims of domestic violence and crimes such as murders and sexual assaults).

Victim Services also provides support to child victims, witnesses, and families of murdered and missing Indigenous persons.

The Compensation for Victims of Crime Program

- Provides compensation (money, services, support) to victims who suffer personal injury, hardships or expenses as a result of certain crimes.
- You can apply for compensation as an immediate family member if you are the spouse, common-law partner, child, parent, or sibling of the deceased victim.
- Benefits available to eligible family members:
- Counselling services, travel and accommodation, bereavement leave, funeral coverage, and crime scene cleaning. Additional benefits may include loss of wages or income.

How to Apply for Compensation

- Separate application forms available for victims, immediate family members, and witnesses.
- You can get the forms you need from the Compensation for Victims of Crime office in Winnipeg, or the office in your area.
- Mail or fax the original application and any attachments

Provides free legal information, summary advice and referrals for low income people in Winnipeg who are trying to solve a legal problem. Services

- LHC offers in-person drop-in clinic on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1:00pm – 4:30pm, on a first come, first serve basis.
- Helps self-represented people provide information, assist in drafting documents and referrals.
- You will meet with a law school student who will help with legal information, advice, and referrals to helpful community resources.

Eligibility

- If your household income is less than \$50,000 and you do not have a lawyer helping with your family law issue.
- Must NOT qualify for Manitoba Legal Aid
- Meet our Financial Eligibility Guideline Limit of \$50,000 annual income.
- May be eligible for a follow-up appointment to get more assistance step-by-step guidance, completing forms, drafting court documents.

- No cost for the Record Suspension assistance provided by the John Howard Society of Manitoba
- If eligible, your costs will be for the acquiring of the required records.
- Also a \$50.00 fee charged by the Parole Board of Canada, due when the application is submitted.
- Help with the process of obtaining a Record Suspension, beginning with your eligibility if a possible candidate, they further assist throughout the application process.

Bail Navigator Program – John Howard Society

Email: jnyman@johnhoward.mb. ca This program is for low- to medium-risk individuals on bail who need support to maintain their release conditions. Those who typically qualify are those with allegations such as: Property crimes, mischief related offences, administrative breaches, driving offences, limited violence offences, and domestic charges where the person's criminal record is not extensive.

Referral by a lawyer required – ask your lawyer to download a referral form at: **johnhoward.mb.ca/bail-program**

• Once referred, individuals are assisted on bail (low to medium risk) who want to improve the outcome of their involvement with the criminal justice system.

The Bail Navigator keeps in regular contact with clients in the program and provides additional supports:

- Check in with participants weekly (in person or phone)
- Offer reminders of court dates.
- Review bail conditions and provide guidance to help clients meet them.
- Can provide referrals to community programs, supports, and services.
- Can help with program information for mental health, substance use, employment and more.

For the Bail Navigator to provide regular contact, program participants must have:

- A verifiable address
- Consistent use of a phone number, email address, or other means (texting app).
